Water Entities, Interaction between State and Federal Law

Biography

Jennifer Gimbel is a Senior Water Policy Scholar at the Colorado Water Institute. She is currently focused on Colorado River issues, with an emphasis on the Upper Basin. She spent three years in Washington D.C., where she was the Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary for Water & Science at the Department of the Interior, overseeing the U.S. Geological Survey and Bureau of Reclamation. She also was Deputy Commissioner for the Bureau of Reclamation and Counselor to the Assistant Secretary. Before going to Washington D.C., Jennifer was the Director of the Colorado Water Conservation Board. She has over 30 years of experience in water issues.



Abstract

The actual management of the water itself is a ground-up process. There are numerous public and private organizations that manage water, from irrigation districts to municipal water utilities. This class will explore those entities and their authorities. The class will also consider several examples of how Colorado water law intersects with Federal water law, as well as summarize the Colorado Water Plan.
